

What is the opposite of freedom? In *Freedom as Marronage*, Neil Roberts answers this question with definitive force: slavery, and from there he unveils powerful new insights on the human condition as it has been understood between these poles. Crucial to his investigation is the concept of marronage—a form of slave escape that was an important aspect of Caribbean and Latin American slave systems. Examining this overlooked phenomenon—one of action from slavery and toward freedom—he deepens our understanding of freedom itself and the origin of our political ideals.







Technology of power: Writing

- The "Requirement" [example 1]
 - A written document that served as a land deed for undiscovered land.
 - Authorized by the Pope and King and Queen.
 - Authorized Europeans to remove people from their ancestral lands.
 - Not written or spoken in an understood language.
 - A reality of European making, an idea, a story that justified violence.

Americas before the Europeans


America After the Europeans.

 - Including their writing, their perspective.






Writing example 2: Conquistador accounts

- Conquistador Chronicles [example 2]
- Essential for ...
 - securing funding
 - authorization for subsequent expeditions.
 - What kind of "true relation" did they tell?

Writing example 3: the treaty

- Where outright occupation failed....treaties were brokered.
- Treaty of Canandaigua
 - Confirmed peace between the six nations and the USA.
 - Inhabitants assured the "free use and enjoyment" of their lands.
 - Treaty has been violated countless times and land reduced considerably.



Today most land in the Americas is still held by Europeans or their descendants. Most people of African and indigenous descent remain dispossessed and/or disproportionally impoverished.

Technology of power: Race

- New societies founded on racial hierarchy.
- Debates over humanity of indigenous people and their enslavement. 1500s.
 - Abolition 1542 [writing]
- African slavery secured
 African descendants a place
 at the bottom of the hierarchy.

Race example 1: Caste system

- Caste laws [also writing]
 - Laws attaching racial labels as well as certain rights and restrictions based on race. [first body of racial law in the Americas]
 - Organized according to proportion of Spanish blood.
 - <u>Purpose:</u> to keep people in a hierarchy and to ensure that they aspired to racial betterment. To enact surveillance.
 - Paintings like this one made to demonstrate colonial control.



Today race continues to exist as a divider in societies across the globe with a strong preference for lighter skin and European appearance. Black and brown people continue to be disproportionately discriminated against.
