(e.g. in our HW 4/5 we had to count how many service requests each department had in order to compute percentages for the donut plot)

~5 minutes to present plus ~1 minute for questions/discussion. Your presentation should touch on the following:

- Explain how you intend to visualize the data
 - What plots/charts did you choose and why?
- What kind of user-controls are available to control the visualizations?
 - Why did you choose those?
 - Why are they meaningful?

(again, the answer need not be very deep or profound)

~5 minutes to present plus ~1 minute for questions/discussion. Your presentation should touch on the following:

- If you have the code partially or fully working, do a brief demo!
- Include other information which you think will be interesting.
- Slides are helpful, but not mandatory. You can put talking points and images in a Word or Google doc too.

Remember, the presentation should be low-stress - have fun with it!
